## International Skydiving Commission Rules & Regulations Committee Annual Report 2025



This year was an exceptional one for the R&R Committee. We initiated a project to set standards for competition committees regarding the use of competition terminology and definitions. We felt there were too many unclarities and diverse and inconsistent use of terms. We also worked on a proposal to further clean up chapter 3 (records) of SC5. In order to do this we had three (long) online meetings and sent up to ten drafts of documents. On top of that we received some input from competition committees and the Bureau, relating to SC5 and the IR's. We still managed to send all relevant documents with proposed changes in time to the ISC Secretary.

The definitions document – if accepted – will have impact on all competition rules. The idea is to have this document accepted and have all competition rules compliant preferably by March 1<sup>st</sup> 2026 but by 2027 latest. As normal, the final call and decision is on the Plenary. We do hope for positive feedback. For the other work done by the committee I refer to the explanations in the proposals.

My thanks for this year go to my R&R colleagues for their work and contributions: Gernot Rittenschober, Richard "Buzz" Bennett, Claire King, Vera Asquith, Rina Gallo and Ralph Schüsser. Buzz Bennett has indicated he steps down from R&R. It goes without saying that his input and work – let alone his previous function as R&R Chair – has been invaluable. I personally wish him all the best in good health. In closing I thank my colleagues for their hard word and contributions in the past year.

- Alternates available to immediately join the Record Formation

## SC<sub>5</sub>

1.1.2 Adding several new definitions as per separate definitions document, and placing them in alphabetical order.

All competition committees are kindly requested analyze up to what point their CRs can be synchronized with the ISC definitions and additional discipline related definitions can be placed in alphabetical order in the CRs.

R&R also would like to have general approval for this at the ISC 2026 Plenary Meeting

- 1.1.2.1 SKYDIVE PARACHUTE JUMP: A parachute jump is a skydive by a person from an aircraft, an aeroplane or a spacecraft with the intention of using a parachute for the whole or a part of the descent to the surface of the earth. Needed change following out of the proposed changes in definitions.
- 1.1.2.7 Team: A number of parachutists jumping or indoor skydivers performing together in an event. A Team is defined in the GS 4.2.2. The composition of a team is defined in the competition rules.

Aligning with the definition as per FAI-GS – a standard definition – with the team composition and medals being the committees prerogative in their CRs.

1.1.2.11 Mondial: An International Sporting Event, comprised of WSC's in all ISC competition disciplines (except IS, CP, WS and PS, which may be included or excluded at the option of the Organiser), taking place concurrently or consecutively in the same location.

Adding the word consecutively allowing events at different times – all the same time, separately or overlapping - during a Mondial.

#### 1.2.1 Documents

Every person parachutist or indoor skydiver who enters a wishes to make competition and/or who wants to set a record, record jumps or performances, which are covered by this Sporting Code, and every Team Manager, must have a valid FAI Sporting Licence (GS, Chapter 3)

Update as per FAI-GS 2025, 4.2.3 "In First Category events, the team leaders are considered as competitors and must have a Sporting Licence."

(note: ISC has asked CASI to have the TM exempted from this obligation)

1.4.1 / 4.5.1.1 / 4.7.2.7 Replace the word deposit with "performance bond" As per 2025 proposal of the Finance Secretary.

Chapter 3 Records. This whole chapter is proposed to be updated and for the sake of discussion it is covered in a separate document.

4.4.1.1 The provisional entry of a NAC for an FCE must reach the Organiser at least 75 days before the start of the competition. The Organiser must then circulate the provisional entry list to all those NACs that have made a provisional entry not more than one week after the provisional entry date. The Organizer is not obliged to accept an official entry from a NAC that did not submit a provisional entry in time.

It is better to inform all NACs so everybody has been notified. And it happens already by means of the ISC mailing list. And adding a protection clause for the Organiser regarding late entries.

- 4.4.1.2 The payment of the entry fee(s) by a NAC for an FCE must be in the hands of the Organiser, on or before a date proposed by the Organiser, subject to approval by the ISC Bureau. In the case of an International Competition, other than an FCE, this deadline is set by the Organiser.
- 4.4.1.3 The official entry of a NAC for an FCE must reach the Organiser at least 45 days before the beginning of the Competition. The payment of the entry fee(s) by a NAC for an FCE must be in the hands of the Organiser on a date as in bulletin #1. If payment is not made the entry is considered invalid but 4.4.4 and 4.4.5 are applicable and sanction fee will be invoiced to the NAC.

  In the case of an International Competition, other than an FCE, these deadlines this deadline are is set by the Organiser.

New stricter process for payment of entry fees, based on an experience at an FCE in 2025. Bottom line is that official entry must be followed up by payment.

#### 4.4.1.5 The list of entrants may be altered at any time until the earlier of:

a) one hour after the take-off of the aircraft carrying competitors making the last official training jump and

b) two hours before the start, as announced by the MD, of the official Team Managers meeting. No further alteration of the entrants list is permitted after this time. (GS 4.8.3)

4.4.1.4 (re numbering) Once the registration period as stated in the bulletin has passed, a NAC may not increase the number of entrants listed on the entry form but may substitute a new entrant for another.

Integral change of the wording, setting an end time until which entrants may be replaced.

#### 4.4.2.2. A National Delegation will be composed of:

Competitors as prescribed in the Competition Rules applicable to the discipline event (i.e. the number of teams or individual competitors and their gender category).

Category is more open than gender, including age (junior), and it is in line with the new proposed records terminology.

#### 4.4.3 Multiple Entries

A competitor or team videographer may enter more than one FCE, discipline or sub-discipline, event taking place at the same time in the same location, but such participation will not be grounds for any protest against the application of 5.2.5.2 nor will the minimum time limits prescribed in 5.2.5.3 apply have any application in respect of jumps/performances made in different FCEs, disciplines or sub-disciplines or events

Adaption in line with the proposed new definitions terminology (1.1.2.7).

## SC5 4.5.7. End of Competition

With regard to Anti-Doping and In-Competition testing of any competitor in any sub-discipline, the competition ends 1 hour after the end of this competitor's last scheduled competition round

#### 4.7 Jury

4.7.1.6. a) The Jury President, the third Juror (not the acting FAI controller), the two Jury members and an eligible reserve (selected, according to their qualifications, their experience, their availability and the number of Juries served on during the previous two years) will be appointed for each FCE by the ISC Plenary Meeting, from the list of ISC Jurors, upon recommendation by the ISC Bureau and the relevant Competition Committee Chairs working in consultation.

The FAI Controller will act as Jury Member from the start of the FCE and will keep the task on the Safety Panel (SC5 4.8) and Video Review Panel (SC5 5.2.6.8).

The FAI Controller will become a Jury Member by default. This saves travel expenses from ISC budget and avoids duplication of tasks. The FAI-C brings the knowledge about bulletins, risk assessment, notice board, toilets, jury office, loudspeaker,... with him into the Jury. The FAI Controller keeps the Safety Panel and Video Review Panel tasks (both cannot be protested) so it is no possible conflict.

Unchanged is the nomination and approval process for the Jury as such (proposed by the bureau and the relevant Competition Committee Chairs working in consultation and then **approved by the plenary**) It is just done for one Jury member already, when the bid is approved (SC5 4.1.1.2).

The clause with all three Jury members on site for multiple FCEs remains, above is about nomination process for one of the Jury members only. The clause about the number of Juries has not been enforced.

4.7.1.7.a) Where a Jury member becomes unable to serve for the whole or part of an FCE, the Jury President may, in consultation with the ISC President (or the ISC First Vice President if the ISC President is not available), appoint a replacement Jury member as required.

That comes by definition of any "Vice..."

- (b) Where a Jury President becomes unable to serve for the whole or part of an FCE, the on-site Jury member will act as Jury President and then will, in consultation with the ISC President (or the ISC First Vice President if the ISC President is not available), appoint a replacement Jury member as required.
- (c) Any replacement Jury member must be selected from the list of ISC Jurors. If none is available, the replacement may be selected from amongst any other person present at the FCE.
- (d) The requirement in 4.7.1.11(b) below to have been present at the previous ISC Plenary meeting or be proposed by a Committee Chair will not apply to appointments made in accordance with 4.7.1.7(a), (b) and (c)

All red text is just a guidance to the ISC Bureau and the relevant Competition Committee Chairs how to come up with their recommendation (4.7.1.6. (a))

All these rules have an escape clause in the end "If none is available..." or "The exceptional circumstances..."

4.7.3.2. Before a protest is submitted, the protester shall follow the complaint procedure in accordance with GS 6.2. The complaint must be made within the same time limitation as for a protest (5.3.1) Any decision on a complaint must be quoted on the protest and/or explained at the

Adding a time limitation on a complaint as otherwise this could hamper finishing a competition.

#### 4.10 MINIMUM PARTICIPATION

When fewer than 4 NACs have entered in an event (see as defined in the Competition Rules,4.2) at an FCE, GS 4.7.1 permits the ISC to determine whether the event will take place and whether the title of Champion will be awarded.

4.10.1 If fewer less than 4 NACs but a minimum of 4 individuals/teams make an official entry and participate, the event will take place, and the title of Champion-(excluding the words World and Continental) will be used. The same provision regarding entries applies to World Cups any other FCE, where the title of Winner is always used.

At the time of entry a NAC does not know how many total entries there will be.

There are no other FCEs than World/Continental championships or World Cups. And this stops the wrong application of "winner" which was also used in the past with an FCE with less than 4 teams and application of the relevant IBD's.

- 4.10.2 An Discipline or Sub-discipline event will be removed as a valid event from the ISC Competition Rules, if
- (a) The event does not take place at two successive FCEs by reason of 4.10.1 above.
- (b) The event has fewer less than 4 NACs participate at two successive FCEs.

Proposed text to remove any interpretation issues regarding the less than 4 NACs issue in relation to categories (e.g. open/female)

- 5.2.5.3. Each competitor is allowed a minimum time from arriving at or returning to (as appropriate) the competition site to the first call for the next jump/appropriate notification for the next performance. The minimum time is:
  - 45 minutes for CF, CF2 sequential, CF4 sequential and WS Acrobatic competitors.
  - 30 minutes for ISF, DY, IFS, AL, ST, CP, PS, SP, CF4 rotation and WS Performance. Shorter time for CF4 rotation as no dirtdiving is needed. The CF committee agrees.
- 5.2.5.4 The minimum time, referred to in 5.2.5.3 above, does not apply to:
- $^{\circ}$  any shorter time period proposed by the MD, provided all affected competitors/teams agree.

That would cover a situation (happened in 2025) when shorter times are needed in order to be able to finish the competition in full.

5.2.6.4 As soon as possible after each jump is completed, the videographer must deliver the video equipment and the video media used to record of that jump for dubbing at the designated dubbing station. The video evidence must remain available for viewing or dubbing download until all results scores are posted as final.

Updated text reflecting the actual hardware/video media situation, and changing 'scores' to 'results' as the (final) results are shown, after possible percentage calculations (CP, WS).

5.2.6.8 A Video Review Panel will be established prior to the start of the official training jumps, 5.2.6.9 consisting of the CJ, the President of the Jury, and the FAI Controller. Decisions rendered by the Video Review Panel shall be final and shall not be subject to protest or review by the Jury. Correction and subsequent renumbering.

5.2.6.9 the number needs to be deleted as one text item was stated in 2 different ones.

5.2.6.13 For AE and WS acrobatic the organiser must provide the teams with a way of identification of the team showing the team number/round to be recorded by the Videographer just before exit.

The recording of this or other clear identification of the team number and round should continue into the jump without any stop in recording. Failure to meet this requirement will result in a score of zero (0) points for the relevant round.

This is very specific to the disciplines so suggestion is to move this part (including CF4 rotation) to the respective competition rules. Both committees agreed.

5.2.10.2 The official scoreboard and its location will be approved designated by the relevant CJ and must be approved by the Jury. The scoreboard may be electronic.

Removal of the Jury in approval of the way of showing results, and where and making this the responsability of the CJ. Who is the person who is responsible for scores anyway. Also, allowing an electronic way of showing scores (e.g. big screen / TV)

- 5.2.10.3 Printed All scores and results must be posted on the official scoreboard. The method of posting will be determined by the relevant CJ in conjunction with the organiser and must be announced before the competition starts.
  - (a) The unofficial results must be posted as soon as they are collated.
  - (b) All official results must be posted as soon as possible. If available electronically the official results must be posted on the FAI/ISC website. Any results that appear on non-FAI/ISC website(s) are considered unofficial, unless they are in the form of direct links to the FAI/ISC website or otherwise authorised by the ISC Bureau. The relevant CJ will ensure that the printed official results are available in time for the award ceremonies.

Proposal to remove the unofficial results, as it states 'all scores' in the first line.

- 5.3.1. The two hour time period is applicable when the competitors in the event are required to be at the competition site. and do not have competition obligations. However, it does not apply from the time the competitors have been called or notified as per 5.2.5.1 until
  - a) they arrive at or return to (as appropriate) the competition site after their jump (for skydivers) or
  - b) they exit the wind tunnel chamber (for indoor skydivers)

The current text of not having competition obligations would in practice lead to very likely not being able to file a protest because these obligations could include anything, and it would be open for debate, hence insolvable arguments. The proposal limits the time to actual performance time.

5.3.2 For the purposes of 5.2.10.3 and 5.3.1, results for a particular event or round are considered official, when posted on the official scoreboard or the FAI/ISC website, with the approval signature of the CJ thereon.

Change of words, allowing electronic approval instead of a signature on paper.

5.4.1 The MD will determine whether the severity of the infringement (using the categories defined in GS 6.1.2) leads to a warning or to the penalties described in 5.4.2, The MD will determine whether the infringement is Technical, Serious, or Unsporting Behaviour.

A repetition of any infringement that led to a warning will result in automatic application of a penalty described in 5.4.2.

- A Technical Infringement is an infringement of the rules or a failure to comply with requirements, caused by mistake or inadvertence where no advantage has accrued or could have accrued to the competitor or team concerned.
- A Serious Infringement includes dangerous or hazardous actions and any repetition of a Technical Infringement.
- Unsporting Behavior includes cheating, including deliberate attempts to deceive or mislead

The application must be submitted by a NAC, an ISC recognized National Parachuting Authority or a potential Organiser to the ISC President and the ISC Finance Secretary. The ISC Finance Secretary will request an invoice for the relevant Application Fee (2.2.1 and 2.2.4) which will be due on presentation.

An application must contain all the information indicated in Annex 2 "FCE Bid Document Format" and the Application Fee as described in 2.2.1 below must be paid as invoiced by the FAI. As per ISC finance secretary 2025 agenda item and IBD 2025/01.

## FAI Controller Handbook

The duties and responsibilities of the FAI Controller, which commence upon appointment, are:

— To visit and inspect the competition site at a suitable time during the preparation thereof unless deemed unnecessary if deemed necessary by the ISC Bureau and/or the relevant ISC Competition Committee.

This almost does not happen anymore. Most of the time infrastructure is built up maximum 2 weeks before the start of an FCE. And is it costly and time-consuming.

## **Jury Handbook**

The ISC Jury Handbook is proposed to be shortened, referring to the FAI Jury Guidelines and only to state specific ISC Jury tasks and requirements.

ISC Jury specific items on top of the FAI Jury Guidelines.

In the case of any disagreement between information or a requirement in this Handbook and that in an Original Document, e.g. SC5, the Original Document takes precedence over this Handbook.

It is the responsibility of the ISC Rules and Regulations Committee to prepare, maintain and publish this Jury Handbook.

Jurors having queries, problems or disputes regarding this Handbook or any other matter concerning their duties and responsibilities should contact a member of the ISC Bureau.

Any ISC FCE shall have a NOMINATED JURY (GS 5.2.4.2, SC5 4.7.1) consisting of three persons, a Jury President and two Jury Members, all appointed by the ISC. For a Parachute-Ski FCE the appointment will be in accordance with the Parachute-Ski Competition Rules.

 The FAI controller will act as a Jury Member from the start of the FCE and keep the tasks as a member of the Safety Panel (SC 5.4.8) and Video Review Panel (SC5 5.2.6.8).

No conflict of interest is possible because of SC5 4.8.9. "A decision of the Safety Panel is not subject to protest or appeal to the Jury."

The event may not begin until the Jury and the CJ have given their approval (SC5 4.5.1). The Jury may not give its approval until

- 1. it receives confirmation that the required Deposit has been paid to the FAI or the required Guarantee has been provided (FCEAD 2.2.3)
- 2. the provisional estimate of the Sanction Fee (SC5 4.1.3) has been paid to the FAI and
- 3. the FAI Controller has reported that the state of organisation readiness is satisfactory.
- Post current World and Continental Records on the official information board.
- Handle World / Continental records application procedure as in SC5 3.1.3.5(a) Annex ISC Record Claims Spreadsheet.

#### Validation of the FCE

- Verification of results: to be confirmed by the CJ.
- Payment of the final amount of the Sanction fee: to be confirmed by the FAI controller.
- Send the officially accepted entry list and official results of the FCE(s), within 24 hours of the
  end of the FCE, electronically to the FAI secretariat (<u>Sec.Gen@fai.org</u>) and the ISC President
  (<u>amparacuellos@gmail.com</u>) with a copy to the ISC Recording Secretary
  (veraasquith@gmail.com) and FAI records (record@fai.org)
- In accordance with the SC5 4.7.2.(7), the Jury will, within eight (8) days of the conclusion of the event, prepare and submit a report to the ISC Bureau as to whether or not all the Organiser's contractual commitments have been satisfactorily completed. This report will also be sent to the Organiser at the same time as to the ISC Bureau.
- It may be considered necessary to hold a debriefing session regarding the running of the competition with officials and competitors. In this case it is suggested that the debriefing is organised and chaired by the Jury President.

#### 3.7.1 Content of the Agenda

The Agenda, which will be established by the ISC President in conjunction with the ISC Recording Secretary and in consultation with the Chairs of the ISC Committees and Working Groups, will be sent out with the notice convening the meeting.

The Agenda that is sent out will contain (but is not limited to) the following items, which must be submitted in writing to the ISC President or and ISC Recording Secretary no later than December 1st in the calendar year before the Plenary Meeting in question:

This saves time and effort for the ISC President to forward the documents to the ISC Secretary.

#### 3.7.3 Proposals

Proposals or other items for discussion may only be included in the Agenda if submitted in writing to the ISC President or and ISC Recording Secretary no later than December 1st in the calendar year before the Plenary Meeting in question by:

Same reason as above.

#### 5.2.3 Re-Election

The First Vice-President may be re-elected for an unlimited number of terms and shall take office upon election.

This section relates to the 1st Vice-President.

#### 5.5.2 Duties

The Recording Secretary will assist the ISC President in preparing the Agenda for the Plenary Meeting and shall be responsible for preparing and sending the minutes of each Plenary meeting to the President and FAI secretariat before March 1st after within 1st days of that meeting's adjournment. The Recording Secretary will document and publish the minutes of all Bureau meetings and all Bureau decisions made between Plenary Meetings.

By request of the ISC Recording Secretary, more time is generally needed and whished for.

#### 5.7 Replacement as Delegate

Should a Bureau Member, other than the Finance Secretary or Recording Secretary, at any time during their elected term, cease, for any reason, to be a Delegate, representing an FAI Active Member in accordance with 3.1 of the FAI By-Laws, that Bureau Member will be considered to have resigned their position and the provisions of 5.9 5.6 will apply.

If such a Bureau Member is reappointed to their original Delegate or Alternate Delegate status by the FAI Active Member before the elections called for in 5.9 5.6 take place, that Bureau Member shall resume their position with immediate effect.

There is no number 5.9 in the Internal Regulations, It should be 5.6.

#### 6.1 ESTABLISHMENT

The ISC shall set up Committees with permanent or temporary status, which shall have specific Terms of Reference for their work and responsibilities, which must be approved by the ISC. The Terms of Reference are attached in report in Annex 5.

#### 3 Technical Workroom

This workroom should have at least one computer connected to the internet and a colour network printer for use by members of the committees and working groups. The computer(s) should include MS Office and Adobe Acrobat software. The printer(s) should be easily accessible by personal computers or function from a memory stick or other storage device.
